





Census of Population


- Designed to provide information about the Canadian population by its demographic and social characteristics
- Census data is available at a much more detailed level based on a wide range of characteristics and variables as well as level of geography

General Social Survey

- Provides information on social trends in order to monitor changes in the living conditions and well-being of Canadians, and information on specific social policy issues
- Specific themes are explored in-depth approximately every five to seven years

Current themes include:

Canadians at work and home Caregiving and care receiving Giving, volunteering and participation Victimization Family Social Identity Time use







Satellite Account of Non-profit Institutions and Volunteering

- Production, income, and outlay accounts of non-profit institutions
- Gross Domestic Product and income of non-profit institutions by activity and subsector

Survey of Household Spending

- Oata available on household spending on a wide variety of goods and services
- Provides information on household and its members' annual income, demographic characteristics, dwelling characteristics, household equipment

Labour Force Survey

- Provides monthly estimates of employment and unemployment data
- Data on employment estimates by industry, occupation, public and private sector, hours worked and much more, all cross-classifiable by a variety of demographic characteristics

Subject characteristics include

Employment and unemployment Hours of work and work arrangements Industries Labour Occupations Unionization and industrial relations Wages, salaries and other earnings

This is especially important at a time when COVID-19 has had an impact on the physical and emotional well-being of Canadians.






